Eaton Rapids Urban Air Rally

“This year’s trip was to Eaton Rapids Air. It is a part of the Urban Air movement. This rally started in 2012.

“Eaton Rapids MI is a small town full of great, old buildings dating back to the 1800s. The city is surrounded by the Grand River. Downtown is an island and their city park is an island too. They have three vehicle bridges and six foot bridges in the city.

“We are headed to Anchorage staying at Creekwood Inn and Campground.



Knowles Coastal Trail. On our return we almost ran into a Bull Moose!! Along this trail you can see Denali!!

“We visited the Farmers Market, Salmon Viewing platforms filled with families fishing very few salmon though. Stopped in at the Visitors Center, the Mint, Hard Rock Cafe to collect our pin and walked Historic Anchorage. No we did not eat reindeer hot dogs (they are sold at the hot dog stands in town)! Also visited the Alaska Botanical Gardens.



“We stayed an extra night to meet fellow Airstreamers with a YouTube Channel “Less Junk more Journey” Nathan and Marissa. They announced the MEET UP at Cabela’s with another YouTuber “Keep Your Daydream” Mark and Trisha. Very insightful on their experiences while traveling with a RV trailer.



“Heading for the Kenai Peninsula a very scenic trip south on Seward Hwy with the mountains, glaciers along Turnagain Arm. Also along this route was a sign posting “Moose Crash Area” 192 Moose killed on the Kenai roads since July 1st!!

“First campground Capt Cook S.R.A. no hook ups but large sites on a “First Come First Served” basis. We saw our first Bald Eagles; they were in our backyard at the campground!!

“Since we were expecting rain this next week we stayed at Alaskan Angler RV Resort with full hook ups in Ninilchik.

Hiked to the beach to view the 4 volcanoes across Cook Inlet(Spurr, Redoubt, Iliamna and St. Augustine), the small boat harbor and the historic Russian Village.

“Also spent the afternoon in Soldotna in search of the Salmon Run stopped at the visitor center then walked along the Classic Fishwalk on the Kenai River to watch the anglers.

“Stopped at Crooked Creek Hatchery to find out the recorded numbers of salmon running and view another spawning area (we saw 1 red salmon). Was told the numbers were very low, the state has put numerous regulations on the amount allowed to be kept except no King Salmon are allowed. Halibut has restrictions too and the razor clams are off limits due to their low abundance.

“We traveled south to see the unique way the tractors take the boats in & out of Cook Inlet at Deep Creek and Anchor Point. Anchor Point is North America’s Most Westerly Highway Point.”

On August 14, Tammy sent more.

“We are arriving into Homer the views are Stunning as it’s a clear day!!

“We camped on the beach at Mariners campground at the beginning of Homer Spit. No hook ups \$24 a nite with Awesome views less crowds.

“We biked the trail along the Spit to the End of the Road Park, saw numerous Glaciers, Seafarers Memorial, the “Fishing Hole”, small boats harbor looked for the Time Bandit on the “Deadliest Catch”, saw the eagles nest, the Wooden Boats Society/Museum, saw a raft of otters in Kachemak Bay.

“Biked to the Farmers Market, dined at Capt Patty’s and Glacial D’s for Halibut they were both highly recommended. 2Thumbs up from us!!

“We enjoyed many late afternoon entertainment on our beach from 1 to 3 eagles and otters looking for food and the low tides which are similar to the Bay of Fundy. Drove the Skyline Drive for more Magnificent views of the glaciers, Kachemak Bay and Moose.

“From there we camped at Russian River Falls campground (no hook ups \$18 a nite very spacious)to see the salmon running, boy were we Surprised at our view!!



“Along the Angler Walk we also saw numerous people fishing. We hiked Russian River Falls to see the salmon trying to jump up the falls to spawn.”
