Blair sent the following account of the latest trip: "Following our Clermont rally, **Sallie** and I skipped the Region 3 rally and returned to Williamsburg after an absence of nine years.

Following our long-time rule of 230, we spend three days on the road stopping at 2:30 pm or 230 miles, whichever comes first. This generally gets us off the road by early afternoon and gives us time for shopping or gassing up the truck if there has been no Flying J Truck Stop on our route.

On Wednesday we left I-95 in southern Virginia and crossed a wilderness of small towns and narrow roads to reach the Jamestown-Scotland Ferry which took us, and many other cars and trucks, across the James River to the historic Jamestown settlement, and then just a short hop to our campground in Williamsburg. We paid for seven nights using our Passport America card. It worked out to just under \$24 per night, far less than any other campground in the area and only about eight miles to the Visitors Center and Historic Area. With so much time available, we were able to visit Jamestown, Yorktown and Williamsburg without wearing ourselves out.

From there we drove west to the Charlottesville KOA and paid twice the rate we had enjoyed in Williamsburg. We arrived in time for a quick lunch and then made our way to Monticello, the home of Thomas Jefferson, our third President. On previous trips the tour of the house was self-guided and limited to the first floor. This time they have added a two-hour guided tour of all four floors, basement to the dome room, very interesting and well worth the time and admission fee. The stairs are very narrow and steep. I was proud of how Sallie was able to navigate them without too much difficulty. The next morning, Thursday, we slept late and went to the Michie Tavern for lunch of fried chicken, pulled pork bbq, black-eyed peas and other things southern. Another adventure not to be missed.

Friday morning we packed up and drove to our summer home, Doughton Park Campground, on the Blue Ridge Parkway, just south of the Virginia/North Carolina state line. We will be here as volunteer camp hosts until the end of October and the time for our fall rally in Okeechobee City.

We hope to see you sometime this summer."

A Summer Tradition Continues

Charlie and Peggy Matthews have plans for another busy summer. They will continue a summer tradition by volunteering at a Wesleyan Methodist Church Camp near Denton, MD. In operation for 122 years, it is a large camp on approximately 350 acres, east of the Chesapeake Bay, approximately 60 miles from Annapolis, Baltimore and Washington, DC.

The camp has 3 large dormitories, a dining facility which seats 400+, a large worship center, a laundromat and 81 individual cottages. Additional facilities include a large maintenance garage, a snack shop, a camp store and many storage buildings. There are 50 RV sites with full hookups.

Since the buildings are in a wooded area, they collect green algae and black mold during the winter months and must be cleaned prior to the opening of camp in mid-June. In recent years Charlie has taken on the task of power washing the buildings and checking for problems needing immediate attention. Peggy is responsible for cleaning and maintaining the laundromat during the camping season, involving many hours of work.

The youth camps are divided K-6th grade, 7-9th grade and 10-12th grade. Total enrollment for the summer is expected to be around 500 young people, a large undertaking with a tremendous amount of planning for each group's chairpersons, the counselors and the additional workers who assist wherever needed. The last weekend of July through the first weekend of August, family camp is in full swing with over 1000 people on the grounds. Special speakers and musicians conduct the services each evening in the worship center; during the day there are different activities such as Bible study, crafts, games, etc.

Charlie and Peggy met at this camp when he was 14 and Peggy was 12; understandably, it is a very special place for them.

When camp closes, they will visit friends and relatives in New Jersey, Delaware and Tennessee before attending the Southern Gospel National Quartet Convention in Pigeon Forge, TN in late September.

Rafters' Southeastern Travels

In March/April, **Mike and Alicia Rafter** joined 22 other Airstreams for the "Georgia Plantations and More" Caravan. Although they have previously traveled many miles in Georgia, they had not been to most of the area covered by the caravan.
